





Village Centre Enhancement Exhibition

On 19 and 20 January 2007 an Exhibition was held in the village hall organised by Liss Parish Council and Liss Village Plan and Design Partnership, to consult with villagers on ideas to enhance the centre of Liss. The objective is to make Liss Village Centre a more attractive place in which to work and shop.









There is still a great deal of work to be done before a scheme of this kind could proceed, not least detailed discussions with the traders and the residents who live in Lower Mead above the shops. The project will also require some considerable external funding.



By far the most comments made at the Exhibition on other issues concerned litter. A number of additional litter bins have been provided but far too many people - and they are mostly local residents - continue to drop their litter in the streets. The Parish Council has recently employed a part- time litter- picker to supplement the cleaning undertaken by EHDC. However, some of the worst examples are around the level crossing on private land, over which we have no control.



Many villagers also asked to have more trees planted in the centre. The Partnership is working on this at present and hopes to have proposals to put to the Parish Council over the next few months.

Small improvements have already been made to both Station Road and Liss Station and we hope to continue making improvements over the next few months.



There is a vast amount to be done to bring the ideas to fruition. Anyone who would like to help in any way would be most welcome. Please do not hesitate to contact The Parish Clerk.

The article on Page 2 describes the new neighbourhood policing arrangements being introduced into East Hampshire. There are currently 17 Police Community Support Officers in post, including Stuart Neal who will work full time in Liss. However the long-term allocation is for only 12 PCSOs with the result that the first 5 officers to leave or move on to other posts will not be replaced. We wish to ensure that this does result in a reduction of resources allocated to Liss. For this reason it is important that residents who are subjected to crime or anti-social behaviour report the incidents to the police. This can be done by phoning 08450 454545



Dispersal Order

The Police now have powers to order groups that are intimidating, harassing, alarming or distressing members of the public by their behaviour from localities and to level charges if the individuals concerned return to the area within 24 hours. The scheme is in operation in Alton, with initial success, and is to be applied to the Centre of Liss. The scheme is for an initial 6-month period. Maps of the dispersal area are on display at various locations in the village.

What are your Policing Priorities for Liss?

By April 1 the Police, working in partnership with the local community and local Councils, will have introduced a new "Neighbourhood Policing Model" into East Hampshire. Under the new arrangements there will be increasing emphasis on community policing. In Liss there will be a dedicated Neighbourhood Officer (PC Eliot Mowbray) supported by a Police Community Support Officer (PCSO Stuart Neal). Both will work full time in Liss.

The key principles of the Neighbourhood Policing Model are that:

- 1. District and parish councillors will act as advocates for their community and help identify the key policing issues for their communities.
- 2. An EHDC Community Safety Partnership, with representatives from a wide cross section of the community, will be responsible for responding to those issues.
- 3. Through the EHDC Community Safety Partnership, the Neighbourhood Officers and PCSOs will manage the issues in partnership with other agencies.
- 4. There will be an accountable monitoring and feedback process.

As will be seen the Parish Council will be expected to help identify the key policing issues that affect Liss. To help in this task we hope as many local residents as possible could let the Parish Clerk know what are their key priorities for policing in the village, such as vandalism or under age purchasing of alcohol. This will enable the Parish Council to represent the concerns to the Community Safety Partnership. In the first instance, please limit your response to 5 issues. They can be sent by letter, by dropping in comments to the Parish Office or by e-mail (to lissparish@aol.com).

Litter

In an attempt to combat the persistent litter problem that blights the centre of the village the Parish Council have employed its own litter warden. The warden will be out and about in the centre of Liss on Tuesdays and Thursdays; this will be in addition to the three times weekly visits of EHDC's contractors. EHDC's criteria states that village centres should get their bins emptied twice a week, but the problems of Liss have required more frequent visits! It is hoped that our new initiative will engender a greater feeling of civic pride in people and lead to a more attractive environment for all our residents and visitors.

The newly appointed litter warden is none other than Ray Swift who has found his recent period of retirement (all of four months) too much to bear; we welcome him back to LPC service. Ray is pictured with his "chariot".





Crossover Youth Centre to Expand

From the 1st March Crossover will again be increasing its opening hours to meet demand and cater for a different pattern of use.

Every day from Monday to Friday the Centre will be open from 4.00 to 6.00pm for the younger age group (ages 10 to 14). There will then also be later sessions on Mondays from 6.30 to 8.30pm for school years 6 and 7 (ages 10 -11), on Tuesdays and Wednesdays from 7.00 to 9.00pm for all ages 10 - 17, on Thursdays from 7.00 to 9.30pm for ages 15-17, and on some Fridays from 7.00 to 9.00pm for the popular Young Women Only Nights and for special events which will be publicised from time to time.

Crossover is still at the developmental stage and these increased opening hours will be trialled for a few months and then increased and/or changed in response to demand and the availability of adult volunteers to staff the centre.

Village Lives – Ernst Warstat

At the turn of the year one of our Council employees retired after fifteen years service. Over that period 'Ernie' Warstat became a familiar sight as he walked the roads of Liss clearing litter and helping to make the village a cleaner more pleasant place. Although a Selborne resident he became popular with Liss villagers who would often stop to chat with him as he did his rounds.

The story of Ernie's life is an unusual & interesting one that involves three villages. He was born in 1925 in a small village in East Prussia and as a lad worked in the stables of the local Baron where he developed his life-long love of horses and the countryside. Like most young men in Germany at the time, Ernie was conscripted into the armed services and he found himself involved in one of the most terrible campaigns of World War Two on the Eastern Front. He and his comrades were forced to retreat by the rapidly advancing Russian army. He was captured by the American army who then passed him on to the British; he was then sent to work as a POW and has remained here ever since.

After the war Ernie was cut off from his surviving relatives by the partitioning of Germany; however, he met and married an English girl and also found work on a local estate. Later he worked in aeronautics at Lasham airfield.

The trees will certainly become a Christmas fixture and we should like to encourage more carol singing.

This includes lecturing, fund raising, care visiting, veterinary liaison and many other commitments (some not so pleasant) undertaken by the nation's oldest registered charity.

Without our "Cat Lady" Liss would have been, for generations of animals, a poorer and far less safe and happy, place.
