National Park Threat to Liss

The long-awaited Public Inquiry Inspector's report on the South Downs National Park was published on July 2nd. The report is now open for public consultation for six weeks ending on 13 August.

The Inspector has recommended that the South Downs should become a National Park, but that the Western Weald, including Liss, Petersfield, Midhurst and Petworth should be excluded. He has also cast doubt on whether the Upper Rother Valley should remain an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty, a status that has helped conserve the beautiful countryside in which we live since the 1960s. The impact of the A3 and the railway are particularly emphasised.



The boundary put to the public inquiry had wide support both locally and nationally with over 500 representations made in support of the boundary as drawn through the Western Weald in Hampshire. Its exclusion at this late stage represents a fundamental change. The objection, put forward mainly by West Sussex County Council and Chichester District Council, affects both Sussex and Hampshire. Hampshire County Council and East Hampshire District Council continue to favour the wider boundary put to the public inquiry.

This is only a recommendation to Ministers. The recommendation does not have to be accepted.

Liss Parish Council will fight this recommendation and will not be fighting alone. It is a member of the South Downs Campaign, an association of over 100 national, regional and local amenity groups and parish councils. The Campaign is pledged to fight this exclusion of the Western Weald and to overturn this flawed recommendation. The accompanying photograph shows the rally held in support of the Western Weald attended by Brian Blessed, the President of the Council for National Parks.

Defra has chosen to consult in the middle of the holiday period for a mere six weeks, instead of the usual twelve weeks that is normally allowed. Defra is also trying to minimise the grounds for objection, so that the principle of exclusion is not debated.

Liss Parish Council is outraged by this undemocratic process on a matter that is crucial to the long-term future of this beautiful countryside. The Council has written to Jonathan Shaw MP, the Minister responsible in Defra, and our local MP, Michael Mates, expressing our anger.

What You Can Do

• Write to the Minister, Jonathan Shaw, at the address shown in the enclosed South Downs leaflet and our local MP, Michael Mates MP at the House of Commons complaining about the 6 weeks consultation period and the narrow grounds for objection.

• Emphasise the wide support for the boundary that included the Western Weald and formed the basis for the Public Inquiry.

• Say that you do not recognise the description of the Upper Rother Valley given in the Inspector's report. Remind the Inspector that Liss is described as the "Hidden Village" because it does not impose itself on the landscape but merges into it.

• Question the impact of the landscaped A 3 and the railway on the area.

• Press for the Public Inquiry to be reopened if Defra continue to press the case for excluding the Western Weald from the National Park

Happy Birthday Triangle

2007 marks the 10th anniversary of the opening of the Triangle Community Centre in the old school building. When it first opened its doors the trustees were not absolutely sure whether such a venture could be sustained. Ten years on - those worries have been dispelled and the Triangle has proved to be a huge success, far exceeding the expectations of even the most visionary of its founders. Liss prides itself in the strong community spirit and the Community Centre is at its heart. Many people may be unaware that the Triangle is independent of the Council and is run by a charity (the Community Association) which is responsible for raising the funds needed to keep it open (currently an astonishing £1,500 per week!). Every year the costs of insurance, heat and light, maintenance, cleaning and general expenses of the Triangle have risen far faster than inflation. Most of the income comes from room hire and from activities organized by the Association; the rest is derived from grants – not least from the Parish Council. However, the overall level of grant aid is due to fall in future years and despite its current success the financial future of the Triangle is far from certain.

To celebrate its tenth birthday the Triangle volunteers have been distributing a leaflet throughout the village. The pamphlet (the design and production of which was generously sponsored by Shillings of West Liss) aims to raise the profile of the Triangle and what it offers to everyone – young and old alike. Coupled with this, the Trustees have launched the 'Friends of the Triangle' scheme, the aim of which is to put its finances on a more sound footing. If the Triangle is to continue to be at the heart of the community it is vital that as many people as possible contribute to the scheme. Please help if you can.

A word on the subject of Allotments.....

At the mid-point in the growing season gardeners can adjudge their efforts so far in what has been a challenging year, starting from an exceptionally dry spring, with a virtual absence of rain in our area for nearly eight weeks followed by heavy rainfall in much of May & June.

In tune with the vogue for "All Things Green" we have seen an unprecedented demand for allotment plots this year, at the time of writing there are still over thirty people who have their names down for plots, we have been able and continue to clear for occupation plots that have been out of use for many years, but even that will not satisfy the demand for this year.

The Parish Council Grounds Committee which oversees allotments will have to appraise the situation for next year, should the demand continue. In the meantime inspections of existing plots have been taking place and some holders have regretfully been written to regarding the lack of cultivation or state of the plot under their tenancy. Inspections will continue and whilst it is understood many holders have tended their plots for a number of years, if there are signs that they are unable to keep up with cultivation, then they should consider surrendering their holding or discussing with the Parish Council office how they intend to manage the plot in future.

At their last meeting the Grounds Committee unanimously decided that the letting of "double plots" to anyone other than those already in possession of a double plot will cease.

For those Parishioners with allotments it is a good idea, if you are not already a member, to consider joining your local horticultural society. With summer shows fast approaching there will be a chance to display your prize produce, you could be surprised how well it is judged...

Renewals for allotment plots will take place early in the New Year and by the end of February the Parish Office will have details of plots that are not being retained and are available for re-letting, there are nearly 100 plots of varying size spread over a number of locations around the village, so for those of you that have been disappointed this year in being unable to obtain a plot, please make sure your application for next year is registered in good time after New Year.
