

Dog fouling – Clean it up please Why should I clean up after my dog?

It is an offence under the Dogs (Fouling of Land) Act 1996 not to clear up immediately after your dog has fouled. Dog fouling in public areas is anti-social. It is unpleasant to look at, smells and attracts flies. Dog waste is associated with a number of diseases including toxicarasis. Toxocara is a roundworm commonly found in dogs, and almost all puppies. Eggs from the roundworm are found in dog waste, where they pose a health risk particularly to small children. The parasite



can cause stomach upsets, sore throats, asthma and in some cases blindness. EHDC officers visit Liss regularly and if you are witnessed failing to clear up your dogs waste, you will be offered a Fixed Penalty Notice. Similar to a speeding ticket, you have the option to accept this Notice and pay the fixed penalty off within 14 days, or alternatively face prosecution in the Magistrates' Court. The maximum penalty upon conviction is currently £1,000. It is no defence to claim ignorance of the dog's actions. Registered blind people are exempt.

How do I clean up after my dog? Frstly, be prepared - always carry a poop-scoop or bag. A variety of disposable dog fouling bags and scoops are available from pet shops and other retail outlets - although a carrier bag will suffice. Follow these simple guidelines:

1 place hand in plastic bag

2 pick up dog waste using plastic bag

3 turn the bag inside out so dog waste is inside 4 tie the bag up. Ensure the dog waste is removed in its entirety and that bags are tied up before disposal. Where bins are available, place the bag inside the special bins provided at the village recreation grounds. Bins are also placed at other locations around the village.



Where and when must I clean up after my dog? It is an offence not to clear up immediately after your dog on all land, both public and private to which the public has access. These areas include:

* highways (including private roads) and footways

*open spaces

* playing fields / public parks

*verges

*play areas

*housing amenity greens *public footpaths * bridleways and adjoining verges. Please help us achieve our aim to eradicate dog fouling by being a responsible dog owner, thereby enabling everyone to enjoy the environment and pleasant surroundings in Liss.

Liss Mini Crew Day 24th July 10am – 4pm

EHDC's Community Safety team, together with Hants Police, are organising a Mini Crew Day to

be held on 24th July. The day will involve community action with village youngsters to carry out graffiti removal & litter picking; as a reward for their help there will be a bouncy castle & and a barbeque run by Liss Scouts.

EHDC & DRUM Housing are also intending to have some strategically placed skips for the removal of unwanted white goods & other household items.

Allotments Access

Only plot holders with a current agreement are allowed onto to allotment areas, any other persons entering into these areas are committing trespass.

There is no public right of way through any of the allotments and it is an offence to bring dogs onto allotments.

The Parish Council takes damage to growing crops very seriously and will liaise with the police regarding such matters as well as pursuing persistent trespassers.

Hedges... a time to trim...

We are well into the growing season and the hedges in Liss which enhance the village and give it a rural feel need regular maintenance and cutting back. This is especially important where they act as boundaries alongside pavements, so that pedestrians and those using buggies, prams or mobility vehicles can move about easily without getting caught overgrown/overhanging vegetation. Regular cutting back is also necessary at road junctions so that adequate sight lines can be maintained for all road users.
