



A Timely Reminder... OVERGROWN HEDGES

We are very lucky in Liss as the large number of hedges give the village a very rural feel and greatly enhance it, but they do require regular maintenance and cutting back. This is particularly important where they act as boundaries alongside pavements so that pedestrians and those using prams, buggies or mobility vehicles can move about easily without getting caught up on any overgrown/overhanging vegetation. This regular cutting back is also necessary at road junctions to maintain adequate sight lines for all road users.



Importance of Planning

Planning is an important function of the Local Authority, and can have an impact on all of us as individuals or as a Parish.



Planning applications are now being submitted to East Hants District Council electronically and Liss Parish Council as a statutory consultee is asked to submit comments on these electronically.

EHDC notifies adjacent neighbours about applications that may affect them and invites these residents to make comments, by letter or e-mail. Your input (however minor) by way of both positive and negative comments is greatly valued and can be really worthwhile. If residents are somewhat daunted by officialdom or need help with their concerns please don't hesitate to contact the Parish Council or your local EHDC councillors – Gina Logan 893690 or Elizabeth Cartwright 892311.



The Parish Council believes it is very important to know what residents are saying about planning applications and we would ask that any residents submitting comments to EHDC electronically also provide a copy to Liss Parish Council at lissparish@aol.com



By doing this local people can often usefully alert us to valid planning concerns which we may not otherwise become aware of. Please can residents who don't have access to computers and the internet and write to EHDC with their concerns continue to supply copies to the Parish Council.

Liss Christmas Fair - Wednesday, 9th December 2009

The Triangle will again hold a Craft Fair together with a traditional offer of mulled wine and mince pies. Most importantly Santa will be in his grotto, there will be a children's fun fair and in the village hall a working model railway. LPC community projects

Like London buses, you wait and wait and then several turn up all at once. So has it been with LPC community projects over the past six months. After the lengthy process of Council debate and decision, followed by the securing of funding, LPC has seen four projects completed that will improve amenities for residents; these are:

Replacement paving in the Village Centre. After years of complaints about uneven footpaths and trip hazards we are having the old unattractive tarmac pavements resurfaced with block paving that not only looks one hundred percent better but will also prove to be easier to maintain when repairs or new services need to be installed. We appreciate that there has been some disruption for traders, pedestrians and parking, but hope you will agree that it will have been worth it. It was a pity that Network Rail had no site engineer to attend after the first two weeks of the project – as this has caused the extensive delay to completion. LPC would like to thank Trevor How of HCC for the design, HCC Highways East for the works and especially the village traders for their patience and understanding. The project was funded by HCC Villages Initiatives Fund, EHDC and LPC.

Provision of Disabled Access footpath to play area at West Liss recreation ground. We are required by law to ensure that reasonable provision is made for disabled access to all our facilities. This is primarily aimed at ensuring access for disabled carers of children. The project now completes suitable access to all three of our play areas. Funding came from the Developers' Contribution Fund for Open Spaces.

New kissing gates and stream crossing at the Riverside Walk/10 Acre Field site. This project replaced the broken down stiles at both sides of 10 Acre Field with metal kissing gates for easier access as well as creating a firmer footpath. Also, we renewed the stream crossing linking the footpath across 10 Acre Field to the Riverside Walk. The project was funded by grants from HCC Rights of Way – Countryside Access, EHDC & LPC. We would like to thank HCC, EHDC, Hampshire Probation Services for supplying the manpower and particularly Tony Grant for devising the scheme and overseeing the works.

Completion of a pedestrian footpath linking Farnham Road to Station Road. Hampshire Highways East have installed a new footpath that links Farnham Road to Station Road and also provided a drop kerb courtesy crossing in Station Road.

In addition we have some other projects coming to fruition; these are:

Enhancements to the Station Road entrance to the Riverside Walk. Tony Grant is to oversee a project to improve the entrance area to the walk. This will include new flower planters, a new bench, new signage, new bins and improved ground surfacing. Trees will also be thinned to improve light. Funding from HCC Rights Of Way – Countryside Access and Developers' Contributions Fund has been secured.

Regeneration of the Princes Bridge Allotment site. We are applying for grants from Local Food (lottery) and have secured Developer' Contribution funding to enable us to convert the run down allotment site at the end of Andlers Ash Road to usable plots in order to meet the huge increase in demand for allotments.

The pond at Newman Collard Playing Field. This is now going to have a management programme as outlined by the Hampshire and IOW Wildlife Trust and we thank Gary Boller of the NCPF Trust who will be coordinating works. Look out for notices requesting volunteer workers.

Once these independent readings have been received and assuming that they are acceptable the situation regarding planning permission will be addressed with EHDC.

The working party will report on progress and ensure that residents are kept informed of developments.

Allotments

Allotments have been in existence for many years and on a map of Liss, dated 1870, the Lower Green Allotments on Rake Road are identified as 'Allotments Gardens'. During this time an allotment was large and used to subsidize the family income by growing the food that they would not have been able to afford to buy.

Allotments today are smaller than in 1870 and have become popular for a number of reasons, including growing food the way you want to and perhaps not with some of the chemicals used by commercial growers, as a hobby, fresher produce than from the shops and reducing your 'carbon footprint'.

Allotments also have a social side; you cannot garden without talking to you neighbours on adjacent plots and to extend this aspect the allotment holders on Lower Green held a barbeque earlier this year.

All allotment holders in Liss have their plots assessed every few months by the Parish Council and are given points for various aspects and the holder with the highest points for the year is presented with an award. This year the winners were Alan and Carole Edwards who were presented with the award at the Liss Horticultural Society Summer Show by Roger Mullenger, Chairman of Liss Parish Council. In addition there were five people who received 'Highly Commended' certificates. (Mike Jordan, Allotment Users Group)
