A meeting of Liss Parish Council took place at 7pm on 19th June 2023 in the Village Hall

89/23 Apologies

Members noted that Cllr Jerrard and District Councillor Roger Mullenger had sent apologies.

90/23 Declarations of Interests and Role as Charity Trustee

Councillors were reminded of the following:

- i. Their responsibility to declare any pecuniary interest they may have in any item of business, no later than when that item is reached.
- ii. That when discussing Charity business, any decision must be made in accordance with the Charities' governing documents, rather than for the benefit of LPC as a whole.

The following non-pecuniary interests were declared:

- Cllrs Wilson, Williams and Olley as Newman Collard Trustees.
- Cllr Olley as candidate for the Parish Representative to the SDNPA.

91/23 Chair's announcements

The Chair welcomed Rebecca Lawrence as the new Assistant Clerk to LPC and Claire Welham as the new Priest in Charge of St. Mary's Church. He also expressed his thanks to the Hampshire Fire and Rescue Service for their hard work in bringing the fire on the Longmoor Ranges under control. The Chair also proposed that the order of the agenda items be amended as Roger Hargreaves was in attendance for item 22 only, the Memorandum of Understanding between LPC and the Newman Collard Playing Fields Trust (NCPFT). Members agreed that, with no members of the public present, the exempt items at 22 on the agenda could be brought forward.

92/23 Adjournment for public participation

No members of the public were present so no adjournment for public participation was required.

93/23 Update from the County Councillor

Cllr Oppenheimer had submitted a written report (**Annex A**).

Cllr Smith enquired about verge cutting. He advised that the issue had come up on social media and it was important for LPC to be able to respond and signpost as necessary.

Cllr Oppenheimer advised that the verge cutting policy was available on the HCC website: [Grass cutting and weed control | Hampshire County Council \(hants.gov.uk\)](https://www.hants.gov.uk/grass-cutting-and-weed-control)

Although HCC were responsible for verge cutting, this had been devolved to EHDC who could exercise discretion in the regime. This meant that both authorities had some influence in the cutting regime.

He noted that the position was evenly split between those wanting verges cut back and those

wanting them left uncut to encourage biodiversity and wildlife. By way of an experiment, Froxfield and Privett Parish Council had been given control of verge cutting under a contract with a local farmer which allowed for cutting decisions to be made on an individual basis.

Cllr James (in his capacity as District Councillor) suggested a Village Forum might be useful to discuss the issue, noting the importance of sight lines whilst leaving specified areas uncut. Input from residents would be particularly important if there was any decision to devolve responsibility further in due course.

Cllr Oppenheimer noted that with rewilding the cuttings had to be collected so there were resource implications. He offered to put Cllr James in touch the relevant team at HCC and suggested he contact Cllr Rob Mocatta on the issue.

94/23 Update from the District Councillors

Cllr Roger Mullenger had submitted a written report which had been circulated prior to the meeting (**Annex B**).

Cllr James had nothing to add as he had intended to raise verge cutting which had already been covered.

Cllr Wilson asked whether the 500 trees planted in the EHDC area behind West Liss Recreation Ground were receiving any after care.

Cllr Budden highlighted that the cancellation of the EHDC Scrutiny Committee (as it was inquorate) had not been communicated to those waiting to watch the meeting on Zoom.

Cllr Oppenheimer left the meeting at the point.

95/23 Exempt session

Resolved: That the following items be taken in exempt session with Roger Hargreaves to remain present as the co-opted member to the Facilities Committee and LPC lead on the MOU (proposed by Cllr Wilson and seconded by Cllr Smith with all in favour)

96/23 Memorandum of Understanding between LPC and NCPFT: Exempt Minutes

Roger Hargreaves left the meeting at this point.

97/23 Councillor co-option

Resolved: That Selina Stratford-Tuke be co-opted as councillor to the Liss Ward (proposed by Cllr Williams and seconded by Cllr Payne with all in favour).

98/23 Longmoor Range: Exempt Minutes

99/23 Minutes of the meeting of Council of 15th May 2023

Resolved: That the minutes of the Council meeting of 15th May 2023 be approved as an accurate record (proposed by Cllr Wilson and seconded by Cllr Olley and with all in favour).

100/23 Matters arising

There were no issues arising.

101/23 RFO's reports on payments and receipts for the period 9th May 2023 to 13th June 2023

The Clerk highlighted any unusual payments in the report. Cllr Tordoff asked about allotment water supply costs and Cllr Williams advised that these varied due to the timing of billing between sites. The Clerk proposed to look at costs for the past year to enable a better comparison.

Resolved: That the receipts and payments reported in the Responsible Finance Officer's Report for the period 19th May 2023 to 13th June 2023, for both the Liss Parish Council and the Charities' accounts, be approved (proposed by Cllr Williams and seconded by Cllr Olley with all in favour) as at **Annex C**.

102/23 Report of the Finance Committee of 5th June 2023

102/23 Report of the Finance Committee of 5th June 2023

Cllr Williams, as Chair of the Finance Committee, noted that the draft minutes had not yet been finalised and would be reported to the July meeting of Council. However, the outcomes of the meeting formed the basis of the following agenda item.

103/23 End of year financial arrangements

Cllr Williams highlighted that the accounts were all in good order which had been confirmed by the Internal Auditor.

It was resolved that:

- a) That Liss Parish Council approve the audited Liss Parish Council accounts for FY 2022/23 (as recommended by Finance Committee).
- b) That Liss Parish Council note the audit report received from Lightatouch for the FY 2022/23.
- c) That Liss Parish Council approve the Annual Governance Statement for the FY 2022/23 and authorise the Chair & Clerk to sign the document accordingly (page 4 refers);
- d) That Liss Parish Council approve the Accounting Statement for the FY 2022/23 and authorise the Chair to sign the document accordingly (page 5 refers);
- e) That Liss Parish Council approve the dates for the exercise of public rights.
- f) That Liss Parish Council confirm that it has no conflict of interest with external auditors BDO LLP.

The motions were proposed by Cllr Williams and seconded by Cllr Olley with all in favour.

104/23 Report of the Planning Committee of 22nd May 2023

Members noted the minutes of the Planning Committee of 22nd May 2023.

Thanks were extended to co-opted Members Sue Halstead and Roger Hargreaves for agreeing to be co-opted to the planning committee for another year

105/23 Report of the Facilities Committee of 12th June 2023

Cllr Wilson, as Chair of the Facilities Committee, invited Cllr Payne to provide an update following a meeting held with the Crossover.

Cllr Payne advised that he had had a very productive meeting with Ben Love, the Chairman of the Crossover Youth Club, including an update on progress in addressing anti-social behaviour in the village. He advised that there appeared to be some confusion as to whether Crossover had met the requirements of the CIL award for this purpose (Resolution 241/22 refers).

Cllr Smith undertook to look into the matter and to draft a letter to the Crossover.

Cllr Wilson noted that recommendations from the Facilities Committee in relation to the Pump Track would be considered as part of the next agenda item.

106/23 Meeting extension

Resolved: That the meeting be extended by a period of no longer than 30 minutes (proposed by Cllr Williams and seconded by Cllr Wilson with all in favour).

107/23 Allocation of additional funding for the pump track project and related items

Members noted the paper which had been circulated prior to the meeting.

It was resolved that:

- a) That Liss Parish Council approve the allocation of up to £1,600 from General Reserves to fund the provision of four benches and an additional bin for the pump track at West Liss Recreation Ground.
- b) That Liss Parish Council release funds in the CCTV EMR of £1,256.81 towards extending CCTV from the Pavilion to cover the children's play area at West Liss Recreation Ground.
- c) That Liss Parish Council allocate an additional sum of £6,831.01 CIL funding to the pump track project, to include the path and CCTV.

The motions were proposed by Cllr Olley and seconded by Cllr Wilson with all in favour.

108/23 Election of Parish Representative to the SDNPA

Resolved: That Liss Parish Council vote for Clive Olley as preferred candidate in the SDNPA Parish Representative Elections 2023 (proposed by Cllr Budden and seconded by Cllr Wilson with all in favour, aside from Cllr Olley who had declared a non-pecuniary interest in the agenda item and refrained from taking part).

109/23 EDHC communication on the Flood Action Group

The Clerk had received a request from the EHDC Safety and Emergency Planning Officer asking whether LPC would assist in bringing the Flood Action Group back into existence. Members agreed that LPC was not in a position to lead on the initiative but would be prepared to provide some support if EHDC was to take the lead, such as using social media to recruit flood wardens.

109/23 CIL Update

The Chair noted that the sum of £28,059.43 had not yet been allocated to projects. In addition, it was possible that the sums allocated to projects to date would not be required in full which could free up further funds. Members noted the update which had been circulated.

110/23 Matters to report

The Clerk advised that the LPC representative to the George Street Trust, Maureen Keel, had reported that an annual grant of £1,000 to the Crossover had been made. In addition, a £5,000 donation which had been awarded elsewhere but subsequently returned, would also be passed to the Crossover as a one-off payment.

Cllr Smith advised that he had come across an opportunity to host a temporary wind turbine. Members noted that an expression of interest would be submitted. Cllr Smith would report back in due course.

Cllr Williams reported that a Newman Collard Trustees meeting had taken place on 15th June 2023 – the siting of the proposed MUGA to be constructed by Coloured Courts had been agreed. The Chair advised that he and Cllr Williams had met with Liss Band who were considering how to mark their 50th anniversary in 2024. One idea which had been floated was the construction of a bandstand but no formal proposal was on the table as yet

The Chair closed the meeting at 21.19 hrs.

1. Highways Update

The drier weather in May has meant that the Highways teams have turned a corner when it comes to getting on top of the pothole situation. By the end of June, we anticipate being back to “business as usual”. The sustained heavy rainfall from January-April this year was unprecedented; roads across the UK were negatively affected. But we need to do better in Hampshire. At HCC we recognise that man-made climate change has led to a changing climate and we need to adapt to it. We are working hard to improve resilience for next Winter and we are bringing in extra funding.

Following all that rain, the hot sunny weather is now causing a lot of rapid vegetation growth. Any issues with overgrowth can be reported on the website at this link:

2. Ancestry records now available for free at Hampshire Records Office (HRO) and at all Hampshire Libraries

You may be aware that many people pay £19.99 per month to subscribe to ancestry records at Ancestry.co.uk. I am pleased to inform you that the entire ancestry database is now available for free at the Winchester HRO and at all Hampshire Libraries. This is a great opportunity to do some research into your family or any local family of interest.

Baptism, burial and marriage records spanning 400 years of history are now available. Prominent Hampshire residents featured in the collection include Florence Nightingale, Jane Austen and Thomas Lord. Dating back to the 16th century, parish records are some of the longest running records available and are some of the best resources to use when tracing family roots. This free new facility may be worthy of an item in Parish Newsletters!

3. Update on Hampshire Forest Partnership

HCC was involved in planting over 10,000 trees during the winter planting season and we are building our partnership all the time. There has been good momentum and I would like to share some key recent highlights as follows:

- Young Tree Growers Guide – HFP have commissioned The Tree Council’s Schools section to produce this guide for children and families, and schools. The guide will

be broken down into approximately 40 resources which will be downloadable via a micro-website. The guide will enable children and families to enjoy seed collection, tree ID and germinating tree seeds.

- Disease-resistant elm project – Already 40 elms have been planted in the Cheriton Parish along rights of way. Another £3k worth of pot grown elms (40 trees) have been donated by the Tree Council and the HFP has been working with the Countryside service and parishes to find homes for these trees. I am very pleased that some are going to Ropley.
- Agroforestry Guidance – The new guidance will inform farmers on the benefits of agroforestry and how it can be implemented within their farming systems. Agroforestry is the planting of trees within arable and pastoral landscapes, both systems have benefits to crops and to livestock. The trees can have a commercial benefit in addition to provision of ecosystem services.
- Tree Guardians scheme – It is increasingly difficult to provide trees with enough water due to the hot and dry summers. This scheme aims to encourage more public involvement with the tree care element of tree planting. Hampshire Forest Partnership would like to give communities the opportunity to ‘adopt’ trees to be responsible for their care and maintenance for the first few years, becoming Tree Guardians. We will provide a guide to care which will involve watering, weeding and mulching. Participants will receive little updates by email to remind them to water during dry weather periods.

4. Stoner Hill: removal of Ash Trees

We are all now aware of Ash Die Back (ADB) and, in particular, of its potential impact on the Ashford Hangers. I would like to address some of the concerns which have been raised about the removal of ash trees along the highway during the closure of Stoner Hill. Many valid points have been made. All the feedback is being carefully considered and I can reassure everyone that lessons are being learnt.

Before addressing the concerns, I would like to highlight three positives from the Ash Tree removal programme:

- It turns out that many of the Ash trees had even more advanced ADB than we realised. Many of them were soft in the middle of the trunk and inevitably would have fallen very soon. These works have therefore been timely and have quite possibly saved lives.

- The extra light now coming onto the Highway has improved visibility and will therefore have an additional positive effect on road safety.
- The sunlight will improve biodiversity on the verges of the highway over the coming years. The stunning views across the valley are also now more visible although this is perhaps not so good for road safety!

The concerns that have been raised are mostly around the messy visual impact of the works, the leaving of tree stumps, the destruction of wild garlic banks and the impact on the natural habitat. I would now like to address those points.

We acknowledge that not all trees were removed immediately. The contract had a tight timescale due to the road closure and the teams had to work in a 5.5hr window each day to get as much work done as possible. This meant that trees were cut and stacked on the road edge ready to be chipped. All trees and arisings were chipped into trailers and transported to drying houses at South East Wood Fuels and then moved onto National Trust Properties to fuel their biomass boilers. The cutting machines sometimes worked at a quicker pace than the chipping machine, and this meant that piles were sometimes left on the road edge ready for chipping the next day. All material has now been removed from site bar a very few small remnants of twigs and branches which will break down naturally and in doing so will be good for insects and fungi.

Some of the tree stumps were left higher than normal, especially on the lower slopes. This was done deliberately to maintain some structure to the bank and to give some kind of barrier should a car leave the road. Some stumps were also left higher due to machine capabilities.

We acknowledge that the bank at the hairpin bend (also known as Garlic Corner) was damaged when the machine went up it. The machine had to enter the area on the corner to access the trees on that bank. The contractor kept this incursion to a minimum to avoid unnecessary damage. They parked the machine there for two nights over the weekend as it was felt that moving the machine back up off-site would have reduced the time they were able to carry out the felling works. They then used the laybys as they moved down the road. The damaged bank area will be reinstated soon.

Some people have asked why the cutting machine was necessary at all. I would like to explain that the contractors had to use the specialist tree-felling equipment due to the nature of Ash Dieback disease. The diseased trees often break apart when felled and therefore it is not safe for operators to fell trees by hand. Across the UK there have been numerous incidents where handcutters have been injured due to this and so as a council policy we require specialist machine equipment to be used.

Finally, I will address the concerns about biodiversity impact. The County Council does not normally carry out works during bird nesting season. It is our general policy to wait until winter. However, on this occasion it was decided that the works could not wait due to the safety risk to the road and its users. Inspections of each tree were carried out before it was felled. We had the HCC ecologist onsite working ahead of the contractors, and checking each tree carefully before works commenced. You may have noticed a few

trees with pink crosses on them remaining. These are trees on which the ecologist stopped work due to bat interest or birds. These trees are undergoing surveys and we will be looking to put in another 2-day closure at some point to have the last of these trees dealt with as soon as we have clearance from the ecologist. I hope that the above is helpful and I hope you will agree that the road safety benefits mean that (overall) this operation can be considered a success.

5. Chawton Flood Alleviation work: next phase

Many people will remember the winter in 2013-2014, when the A32 at Lower Farringdon, parts of Chawton, and the surrounding area were badly affected by flooding caused by a combination of rising ground and surface water. Hampshire Highways has since installed a series of flood prevention measures including ditches, drains, and soakaways, alongside other engineering work to reduce the risk of flooding. The current work is the next phase of this.

The first elements of the construction work started on Tuesday 30 May and are expected to take up to three weeks to complete. For this part of the scheme, the A32 Gosport Road at Farringdon will be closed from Woodside Lane to Kitcombe Lane. A signed diversion will be in place. The A32 will then be re-opened and the remaining works will then take place off the highway.

I am pleased to report that Hampshire Highways will complete a road resurfacing at the same time. We would like to thank residents and businesses for their patience as we undertake these essential works.

6. Parish Forum on Motorbike Noise and Speed

Committee places have been agreed and I am on Overview and Scrutiny, and Audit committees and also a reserve on Planning, and Standards committees.

I was appointed as EHDC representative for Liss Community Association.

Case work

Dealing with case work, some of which has been completed successfully, others are in progress. This includes contact with the MoD over access to the ranges.

Planning

Attended planning training.

Several planning applications have been referred to me for comment. I have reviewed all of them and submitted comments for some. I have asked if a condition can be applied to the permitted development of Hillier's reservoir so that it is removed if it becomes redundant.

There are two tree applications which I will review this week.

Councillor grants

I have been approached about councillors' grants by some organisations. There is a new online application process. I will work with Councillor James to try to ensure that as many residents benefit as possible.
